We have also decided to have a writer in residence this year. The residency will support a writer to develop a piece of work and contribute to the festival also.

As usual, we are eagerly looking forward to seeing all the entries from the many Primary School children. Their poems will be judged by Geraldine Mitchell who has been a great friend of the festival for the past few years. We are always so impressed with the standard of the children's poems and really appreciate the work and dedication of the teachers and schools who participate.

This year we have an exciting free event at Nenagh Library on Saturday morning for our 8 to 11-year-old friends when Nigel Quinlan will enthral them with his story writing workshop.

Thanks to the support of director Eva Birdthistle and the staff of Nenagh Arts Centre through whom we have a great venue to host our writers. To open our festival this year, we are delighted to welcome, one of our own, Julian Gough who will read from his well-received new novel 'Connect'. Sharing the bill will be Lisa Harding who won the Kate O'Brien award for her debut novel 'Harvesting'. On Friday evening we have the very interesting pairing of, internationally acclaimed poet/novelist, Ruth Padel (great, great granddaughter of Charles Darwin) and publishing sensation of the year John Connell, author of 'The Cow Book'. This event will be chaired by Sinead Gleeson. We are very grateful to local company, ABP, who have partnered us to sponsor John Connell's participation. On Saturday night we are honoured to welcome, Man Booker prize winner, John Banville who will be interviewed by Sophie Gorman.

We are privileged to live in one of the most beautiful places in the country. Our guests and visitors love our festival for its range of venues and inspiring locations. On Sunday morning we highlight again our beautiful Dromineer and Lough Derg when we welcome Jessica Lee to join us on Teddy Knight's Ku-Ee-Tu for our 'Afloat' event. We will sail from Dromineer harbour and Jessica will read from her novel 'Turning' in which she describes swimming in all the lakes around Berlin during the course of a year.

Our final event takes place in our atmospheric and beautifully restored Nenagh Castle on Sunday afternoon when James Scully, historian and storyteller will enthral us with the story of Emily Brontë's honeymoon in Banagher, Co. Offaly. (She married local man Arthur Bell Nicholls.) Come and hear Emily's description of meeting her Irish in-laws for the first time. Members of The Nenagh Players will join James to dramatize these events. also have two incredibly singer/songwriters, Claire Watts and Shona Blake, providing music and song for what promises to be a memorable event.

Our visual artists for this year also have strong local links. In 2016 Nenagh writer Henry Martin and illustrator Iro Tsavala published a picture book called Yappo which was supported by a Tipperary Artist Award. Prints from the book can be viewed upstairs in Lough Derg Yacht Club and in Country Choice, Kenyon Street, Nenagh.

On a sombre note I would like to pay tribute to local poet/translator, Toomevara man Seamus Hogan, who sadly passed away recently.

I would like to thank volunteers who come on board at the festival time to make sure things run smoothly! We express our deepest gratitude to our local accommodation providers, cafés, pubs, shops, and restaurants who look after our guests and visitors. WRITERS & ARTISTS



John Banville was born in Wexford, Ireland, in 1945. He is the author of sixteen novels

including The Sea, which won the 2005 Man Booker Prize. In 2011 he was awarded the Franz Kafka Prize, in 2013 he was awarded the Irish PEN Award for Outstanding Achievement in Irish Literature, and in 2014 he won the Prince of Asturias Award, Spain's most important literary prize. His most recent novel is Mrs Osmond. He lives in Dublin.



John Connell is a journalist, a film maker, writer and a farmer. He lives on his family farm in

Birchview, Co. Longford. The Cow Book is his first book.



Maurice Devitt is from Dublin. His work has appeared in numerous publications.

He won the 2015 Trocaire/ Poetry Ireland Competition. Maurice's debut poetry collection, Growing Up in Colour has just been published.



Sinéad Gleeson is a writer, editor and freelance broadcaster and journalist. Her debut

essay collection, Constellations, will be published by Picador in spring 2019. She is the editor of three short story anthologies.



Julian Gough was born in London to Irish parents, grew up in Tipperary, and now lives in

Berlin. As a youth, he sang on four albums with his band, Toasted Heretic. Since then, he has published four novels for adults, and three awardwinning books for children (illustrated by Jim Field) about the exciting adventures of Rabbit & Bear. He also wrote the ending to the world's most popular computer game, Minecraft. He has won the BBC National Short Story Award.



Sophie Gorman is an arts journalist, broadcaster, critic and columnist who

works in print, radio and television.



Lisa Harding is an actor, playwright and writer. Her short stories have been widely

published and anthologised. She graduated from the MPhil in creative writing from Trinity college Dublin in 2014. Harvesting is her first critically acclaimed novel, inspired by her involvement in a campaign fronted by the Childrens' Rights Alliance in 2012 called Stop Sex Trafficking of Children and Young People. It won the Kate O'Brien award, was nominated for best newcomer at the Irish Book Awards 2017.



Jessica J. Lee was born in Canada in 1986. She holds a doctorate in environmental

history and aesthetics. Jessica now lives in Berlin. Turning -Lessons from Swimming Berlin's Lakes is her first book.

Roisin Meaney (Kerry born, Limerick based) is the author of fifteen adult novels

(thirteen with Hachette Books) and two children's books, and her works have been translated into several languages. She is a fan of cats, chocolate, baking and kindness.



Geraldine Mitchell is Dublin-born but now lives on the Co. Mayo coast, not far from

Louisburgh. She is a Patrick Kavanagh Award winner and her most recent collection of poems, Mountains for Breakfast, was published in 2017.



Rick O'Shea is a broadcaster with RTÉ, runs Ireland's largest book club with over 20,000

members and is a literary festival curator. He's also Book Ambassador for Eason and one of the judges for the 2018 UK Costa Book Awards.



Ruth Padel is an awardwinning poet, Professor of Poetry at King's College London. Her

ten collections include Darwin A Life in Poems, a verse biography of her great-greatgrandfather Charles Darwin; The Mara Crossing on human and animal migration; Learning to Make an Oud in Nazareth on the Middle East; and Tidings, a narrative poem on homelessness and Christmas. She is deeply involved in nature conservation. She is the only writer to be Fellow of the Zoological Society of London as well as the Royal Society of Literature. She was Chair of Judges for the 2016 T. S. Eliot Prize, Judge for the 2016 International Man Booker Prize.



Nigel Quinlan is a children's author who lives in Cloughjordan Co Tipperary with his wife

and two children and their pet dog, Rook. His latest book is The Cloak Of Feathers, and his previous book was The Maloneys' Magical Weatherbox. He looks just like his photo, only with more hair. Nigel spends all his time trying to write and not post silly things on twitter @Nigellicus.



Liz Quirke is originally from Tralee, Co. Kerry, now living in Spiddal, Co. Galway. She

was the winner of the 2017
Listowel Writers' Week Originals
Short Poem Competition, the
2016 Dromineer Literary
Festival Flash Fiction
Competition. She holds degrees
from UCC, Dublin City University
and NUI Galway. She is a PhD
researcher at NUI Galway and a
member of the Interface Inagh
Artist Residency Programme.



Ronan Ryan is an Irish writer, based in Dublin but originally from Clonmel. He has an MSc in

Creative Writing from the University of Edinburgh and a PhD in English Literature from Victoria University of Wellington. He has won an Arts Bursary Award in Literature from Dublin City Council. His debut novel, The Fractured Life of Jimmy Dice, was named by the Irish Independent Review as one of their 'Books of the Year'.



James Scully is from Tullamore and has resided in Banagher, County Offaly and Meelick,

Eyrecourt, County Galway for some time. Among his many local history interests are the many literary associations with Banagher, especially those with Charlotte Brontë, Anthony Trollope, Sir Mathew De Renzy and a host of others.

He is the
author of six

poetry collections, the most recent of which is Futures Pass (Salmon Poetry 2018). Under the ironic pseudonym of Sex W. Johnston he has recorded an album with legendary Stranglers frontman, Hugh Cornwell, entitled Sons of Shiva, which has been released on Track Records.

He is a past nominee for The Hennessy Literary Award and his poem 'The Green Owl' won the Listowel Poetry Prize 2007. Also in 2007 he was awarded a Patrick and Katherine Kavanagh Fellowship in Poetry.



Eileen Sheehan is from Scartaglen, now living in Killarney, County Kerry.

Eileen's poetry has appeared in many anthologies. Her work features on Poetry International Web. Her collections are Song of the Midnight Fox and Down the Sunlit Hall (Doghouse Books). Her third collection, The Narrow Way of Souls, was published in 2018 by Salmon Poetry. A poem from this collection features on the Leaving Cert English syllabus 2019 - 2022.
